The purpose of this thesis was to explore a curriculum based measurement procedure and its reliability for practical applications in the educational setting. Twenty third grade oral reading passages were selected from the Dynamic Indicator of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS) system and used to assess reading progress of three third grade classes from different school districts in southwestern Ohio. The DIBELS system includes a comprehensive assessment system that is validated through research and assesses early reading skill development from kindergarten through sixth grade. The standard procedure of using the one-minute median probe of a three probe administration was compared to the alternative procedure of using only the first of three probes. The correlational analysis of single first probe scores was positive and highly significant with median score probes (r537) = .96. p

Reading fluency has been identified as a key component of proficient reading. Research has consistently demonstrated significant and substantial correlations between reading fluency and overall reading achievement. Despite the great potential for fluency to have a significant outcome on students’ reading achievement, it continues to be not well understood by teachers, school administrators and policy makers. The chapters in this volume examine reading fluency from a variety of perspectives. The initial chapter sketches the history of fluency as a literacy instruction component. Following chapters examine recent studies and approaches to reading fluency, followed by chapters that explore actual fluency instruction models and the impact of fluency instruction.
