The Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) was created to ensure that children in low-income areas could have access to nutritious meals during the summer months when school is not in session. During the school year about 15 million low-income children depend on the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) and/or School Breakfast Program (SBP) for nutritious free or reduced-price meals. However, during the summer months, only about 2 million children in low-income areas receive free meals provided by the SFSP. The authorizing legislation required FNS (Food and Nutrition) to conduct an evaluation of the Pilot projects. The three main objectives of the evaluation are to describe the effects of the Pilot

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on: (1) participation by children and service institutions in the SFSP (Summer Food Service Program) in the Pilot States; (2) the quality of meals and supplements served in the Pilot States; and (3) program integrity.
