Drawing on a forgotten trove of colorful mail-order marriage court cases, Zug explores the many troubling legal issues that arise in mail-order marriage: domestic abuse and murder, breach of contract, fraud (especially relating to immigration), and human trafficking and prostitution. She tells the story of how mail-order marriage lost the benign reputation it enjoyed in the Civil War era to become more and more reviled over time, and she argues compellingly that it does not entirely deserve its current reputation. While it is a common misperception that women turn to mail-order marriage as a desperate last resort, most mail-order brides are enticed rather than coerced. Since the first mail-order brides arrived on American shores in 1619, mail-order marriage has enabled women to improve both their marital prospects and their legal, political, and social freedoms. *Buying A Bride* uncovers this history and shows us how mail-order marriage empowers women and should be protected and even encouraged.

The Qualities of a Citizen traces the application of U.S. immigration and naturalization law to women from the 1870s to the late 1960s. As interview transcripts and court documents reveal, when, where, and how women were welcomed into the country depended on their racial status, their roles in the family, and their work skills. Gender and race mattered. The book emphasizes the comparative nature of racial ideologies in which the inclusion of one group often came with the exclusion of another. It explores how U.S. officials insisted on the link between race and gender in understanding America's peculiar brand of nationalism. It also serves as a social history of the law, detailing women's experiences and strategies, successes and failures, to belong to the nation.

Trinities - Trinidadians who have moved to the United States yet consider themselves Trinidadians - are the subject of this study in assimilation. After the passage of the 1965 Immigration and Nationality Act, large numbers of black immigrants from Trinidad and Tobago emigrated to Los Angeles, established a community with networks of kinship, friendship and marriage, and laid down roots. The roots proved to be a very shallow system, however, with relationships restricted to fellow Trinidadians - a process encouraged by race considerations in the US. The author challenges the assumptions of the assimilation school by defining the communities under study not in territorial terms but in terms of interaction.

Attentive to the structural, cultural, and personal factors that prompt women and men to seek marriage partners abroad, *Romance on a Global Stage* questions the dichotomies so frequently drawn between structure and agency, and between global and local levels of analysis.
