While having fun guessing which native animal lives in the different homes or habitats pictured, young children will learn how animals have different strategies for keeping themselves (and their young) safe. Being encouraged to look closely at the pictures teaches observation skills and children will start to learn more about what makes each animal unique.

This book brings together in a unique perspective aspects of natural history dioramas, their history, construction and rationale, interpretation and educational importance, from a number of different countries, from the west coast of the USA, across Europe to China. It describes the journey of dioramas from their inception through development to visions of their future. A complementary journey is that of visitors and their individual sense making and construction of their understanding of their own starting points, often interacting with others (e.g. teachers, peers, parents) as well as media (e.g. labels). Dioramas have been, hitherto, a rather neglected area of museum exhibits but a renaissance is beginning for them and their educational importance in contributing to people’s understanding of the natural world. This volume showcases how dioramas can reach a wide audience and increase access to biological knowledge.

Dioramas, or sculpted models with painted backgrounds, represent a conscious attempt to achieve a powerful art form within a museum context. In them, history and art have merged to create accurate and moving visual records of the events of war. Central to the vision of the Australian War Memorial galleries, which first opened in 1941, dioramas would attempt to convey the fullest possible account of the experiences of Australians who fought in Europe and the Middle East, and on Gallipoli, during the First World War. By establishing this historical perspective, the dioramas were intended to complement, in an engaging way, the more detailed displays in the galleries, which included plan models, uniforms, and artefacts.
