Thereby special characteristics and actions of Shackleton are pointed out. Based on that, the analytical steps are made, with the use of charismatic as well as transformational leadership theories. Thereby a justification of those theories is made as well as the differences of those is highlighted. It's been called the greatest survival story of all time.
